

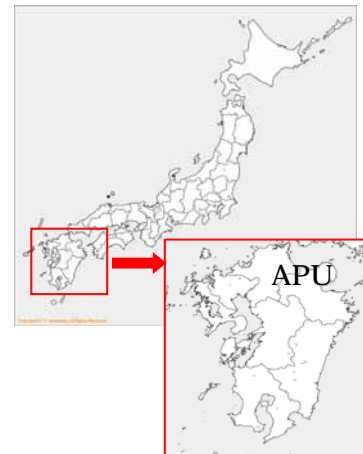

2 . Features of University

History

Ritsumeikan Asia Pacific University (APU) is the fully international higher education institution in Japan. APU was founded in April 2000 through the collaboration of three parties, namely Oita Prefecture, Beppu City and the Ritsumeikan Trust, which is one of the oldest and most distinguished private non-profit educational institutions in Japan. APU's values are based on a vision of freedom, peace and humanity, and the enhancement of international mutual understanding in the Asia Pacific region. Although APU was established only ten years ago, it has already gained recognition as the most international university in Japan with a strong international orientation in its aims, educational programs, teaching faculty, administrative staff, and its enrolled students coming from all over the world.



Location

APU is located on the outskirts of Beppu City (population of approximately 120,000) in Oita Prefecture in Kyushu, the southernmost island of the main Japanese archipelago. Kyushu boasts an incredible variety of natural attractions, ranging from unique scenic landscapes to ski slopes, hot spring baths and surf beaches. Fukuoka, the largest city in Kyushu (1.4 million inhabitants), is only two hours away from APU by express bus.

APU as an International University

APU provides education to approximately 6,000 students, of which about 2,700 (45%) are foreign students from nearly 80 different countries, thus creating a truly multi-cultural environment on its campus. Among these students, 174 are enrolled in the Master's Course and 59 in the Doctoral Course of our Graduate School. All APU undergraduate programs are taught on a bilingual English-Japanese basis, while graduate programs are conducted entirely in English.

Special Features

APU strives to play an important role in the academics of the Asia Pacific region. Despite its short history, APU has already welcomed Nobel Laureates Prof. Muhammad Yunus, Prof. Amartya Sen and Prof. Lee Yuan Tseh for keynote lectures, and has hosted major academic events in collaboration with the United Nations, ASEAN, the Japanese Ministry of Foreign Affairs, and the Asia Pacific Water Forum. APU has also invited corporate executives of leading multinational companies to speak and interact with students on campus. In 2010, APU launched the International Association for Asia Pacific Studies (IAAPS), with an accompanying internationally-refereed journal, *Asia Pacific World*. The first three issues include 33 articles and review papers, numerous book reviews and research notes. The discipline areas of accepted contributions include Sociology (8), Economics and Development (7), History (5), Politics (4), International Relations (3), Tourism (2), Education (2), and Innovation and Business Studies (2). *Asia Pacific World* will also present cutting edge analysis in the areas of, but not limited to, Cultural Studies, Politics, Finance, Marketing, Social Welfare, Environment, New Media, ICT, Linguistics and their impact on the region. These endeavors have the participation of well-known academics from around the world.

Our graduate schools have recently gained appraisal by being selected for prestigious scholarship programs offered by the World Bank, the Asian Development Bank, the Indonesian Government (PHRDP-III) and the Japanese Government. APU's innovative approach to education has repeatedly been recognized under the Japanese Government's "Good Practice" (GP) award.

As our profile grows both in Japan and the world, APU graduate students will have more and more opportunities to come face-to-face with some of the top decision-makers in this region, while gaining a broader exposure for their own research. We value diversity and warmly welcome all those who have a desire to play an active role in fostering international cooperation and sustainable development.

3 . Features of Graduate School

The APU graduate school focuses on fostering Global Leaders with a broad perspective based on the extensive knowledge and skills needed to face the challenges of our world's rapidly transforming society. We will thus actively contribute to the sustainable development and international community symbiosis in the Asia Pacific and the world.

All programs in the Graduate School of Asia Pacific Studies (GSA) are taught entirely in English, and the wide and flexible curriculum allows students to tailor their own study program based on their interests and requirements with their supervisors' consultation. Approximately 40% of our faculty members come from outside Japan, and a significant number of our Japanese faculty holds postgraduate degrees from world-renowned universities. Introductory and beginner Japanese language classes, together with an academic writing course, are available to interested graduate students.

Most subjects are run in two-month quarters per semester, with some courses offered on an intensive basis during the vacation periods between semesters. In addition to regular coursework subjects, all students must complete seminar subjects, including the submission of a final research report or master's thesis.

At APU's Graduate School, students can expect to develop practical policy-making skills through discussions with students dispatched from government agencies in developing countries, students from Japan, and other donor countries. By approaching issues from various perspectives, students will acquire a greater ability to solve problems effectively. Through APU's education that connects theory with practice, students will become practical leaders that can contribute to China's

development in many fields.

4 . Features of the Program

<Master of Science in International Cooperation Policy (ICP) – International Public Administration Program>

Students from China will be accepted into the International Public Administration Program. Upon completion of this two-year Master's Course, students will have the knowledge and skills needed to immediately contribute to the development of China. Being able to negotiate well with donor countries and related institutions in one's own country, as well as create policies for development, are skills highly sought after. Regardless of the ministry or agency they belong to, human resources with these skills are critical for the country's development.

While students learn subjects such as "Special Lecture- United Nation", "International Financial Organization", "Public Administration of Environmental Issues", "Regional Organizations in the Asia Pacific" "International Relations and Regionalism in the Asia Pacific" and "Security Analysis on Japan and the Asia Pacific", they also take part in seminar subjects and fieldwork to further enhance their education and develop themselves into highly-specialized experts in their fields. Students from China will be taught and supervised by faculty members who have worked for many years in international organizations such as JICA, the World Bank, the Asian Development Bank, and so on. By connecting theory with practice, APU's education develops students into practical leaders that can contribute to China's development in many fields.

7 . Facilities

Accommodation

To help new international students adapt to life in Japan smoothly, all graduate students from outside Japan can choose to stay in a private, furnished room in AP House, the university dormitory. There is a Student Office branch located in AP House, along with staff members and Resident Assistants, who all support new students to adapt to Japanese society and their new university life by holding events and programs on campus. AP House is just a short walk from the main campus buildings, and offers 24-hour computer labs, recreational facilities and plenty of communal space for interaction between residents.

Besides AP House, a wide range of private apartments are also available within a short bus ride from the campus, with affordable rent as compared to other Japanese cities. Creotech, a university-affiliated company, provides assistance to students in locating and renting accommodation.

Campus Facilities

APU provides certain facilities exclusively for graduate students, including a spacious common room, separate computer lab, and individual study spaces for PhD students. There are approximately 2,000 high-speed internet connected computers available for student use on campus, and students can also use their own laptops to access the APU network via plug-in ports at several convenient locations or through wireless LAN.

The APU library has an extensive collection of publications in English and Japanese, and students can easily borrow books from all universities within the Ritsumeikan Trust and pick them up at the APU counter. A wide range of academic journals and other useful publications is also available through online databases.

Other on-campus facilities include a cafeteria and cafe catering to a range of dietary requirements, a general store and bookshop. In terms of athletics, APU's facilities include a gym, weight training room, tennis and basketball courts, a soccer field, track, and others.

Support Services

At APU, students have access to a full range of support services on campus. These include a health clinic and counseling service for all students and staff without any charge, and a Student Office that facilitates extra-curricular activities and offers advice on lifestyle issues such as accommodation, budgeting and part-time work.

Since APU is a bilingual campus, all administrative offices such as the Admissions Office, Academic Office and Student Office are managed in both English and Japanese.
